

Palm Sunday of The Passion of The Lord

Roman soldiers poured into Jerusalem for the weeklong festival of Passover. The Romans feared disorder as thousands of Jewish people converged on the city to celebrate how God freed them from slavery in Egypt and led them to freedom.

The Roman Governor, Pontius Pilate, astride a horse, leaves his coastal headquarters at the head of foot soldiers and cavalry and enters Jerusalem. The Romans show their military might to remind the Jewish people of their subjugation.

Jesus, however, enters the city on a donkey a sign of humility and he comes with a different kind of power.

'Tell the daughters of Sion (the inhabitants of Jerusalem) behold your king is coming to you humble and mounted on an ass and on a colt the foal of a donkey'

This is verse five of chapter twenty-one of Matthew's Gospel, part of a longer text proclaimed this year at the blessing of the palms. This is a rephrasing of a verse from the prophet Zechariah who speaks of the king as triumphant and victorious. So, we have two processions into the Holy City. The Romans show their military might and proclaim oppression Jesus as the fulfilment of Old Testament prophecy, enters as a king whose kingdom is marked with love, compassion and mercy.

The Roman Empire no longer exists. But the kingdom of God fills the earth. Our God Reigns.
